Presentation of 50 year jewel - Rt. Wor. Brother Alfred O. (Al) MacPhee

On September 8, 2004, Right Worshipful Brother Alfred O. (Al) MacPhee travelled from his home in Clarenville, NL to attend Stewiacke Lodge No. 98 for the purpose of receiving his fifty year jewel. Brother MacPhee left Nova Scotia immediately following his Master Mason degree in 1954 for a posting with the Royal Canadian Mounted Police in Newfoundland. He remained in that province for his entire career and has retired in Clarenville. Therefore, although a member of Stewiacke Lodge for half a century, it has rarely been possible for him to attend his lodge.

He has, however, maintained a continuing interest in his mother lodge, at the same time distinguishing himself in several craft lodges in Newfoundland. He occupied many offices and served as Worshipful Master in at least three

of them. In addition, he has been active in the District Grand Lodge of Newfoundland of the United Grand Lodge of England, and subsequently in the Grand Lodge of Newfoundland and Labrador. Among the many offices he has occupied were Senior Grand Warden, District Deputy Grand Master, Grand Director of Ceremonies (for a total of nine years), Grand Registrar and Grand Pursuivant.

The evening commenced with dinner at a local restaurant prior to the regular September meeting at which the Deputy Grand Master, Right Worshipful Brother H. Simeon Hardy represented the Grand Master in presenting the jewel to Brother MacPhee.

Brother MacPhee expressed his appreciation for the jewel and the welcome he received. He shared a number of anecdotes about his experiences over the years, and particularly of his experiences in Stewiacke Lodge. 🗡️

Masonry's best asset is the life of the individual Mason - Masonry by example.

Perhaps some of us are forgetting the basic philosophy of freemasonry and are being carried along by the modern misconception that size and numbers are the measure of success, but perhaps this does not apply to the field of Masonry. Numbers alone cannot and should not be associated with morality, brotherly love, truth and benevolence. It would be better that there be three freemasons in the world - and they as wise and worthy as the ancient and venerated patrons of the Order - than there be three million who sully the lambskin apron that everyone is required to wear with pleasure to himself and honour to the Craft.

I don't belittle or deny that our great charitable endeavors are a good thing to help those in need. This is great and worthy

work - but the man puts nothing of his person into it. It is just a donation. We do not need to leave our desks or homes or lodge room to do this.

I truly believe that: if the Masons of the world would be what freemasons are supposed to be; if we would put into daily practice the vows we have made; if we practiced outside of the lodge those great moral duties that are inculcated in it; and if we were genuine Masons at heart and not just the pocketbook, what a different world this would be. Let us work for a return to the "good old ways" when men did not need to see a piece of jewelry to know a man was a Mason. Let us return to personal, daily Masonry by example.

The Stars We Think We See

Freemasonry contains many references to the heavens and few to the heavenly bodies, the sun, moon and stars. A few words about the stars is therefore appropriate.

Any of us looking into the heavens on a clear night would say he saw millions of stars, and most of you may be astounded to be informed that we never actually see any of the stars we think we see. What we actually see are rays of light sent out by those stars. The stars themselves are so many thousands and millions and billions of miles away that the rays we see tonight were on their way to us not last night, or the night before, or last week, or last month, or last year, or many years before that. Some rays that reach us tonight were on their way to us before Masonry was born. Some of the stars are so many billions of miles away that their rays have traveled day and night, at the speed of light, clear nights and dark nights through generations, through centuries, through the rise and fall of nations, through the rise and fall of civilizations, since the birth of Christ, since before the first stones were laid for the Great White Temple which crowned Moriah's Mount, in order to reach us tonight and guide our feet on our way home from this meeting. If the stars were close enough to come within range of our vision their brilliancy would destroy us.

Scientists tell us rays of light still are reaching us from stars that ceased to exist hundreds or thousands or even millions of years ago.

The life of a human is but a moment in the span of time it takes the twinkle of a star to reach us. We live by rays of light produced by stars that have ceased to exist. Masons live by rays of a Great Light produced twenty centuries or more ago. Those who follow us will be guided by what we have done, and we who are here but a fraction of a moment, should hasten to start rays of Masonic light on their way to brethren who shall live a century, or a hundred centuries, or a thousand centuries after we have ceased to exist.

One Day Class-Pennsylvania

On Saturday, October 2, 2004, the state of Pennsylvania was the home of the very first "Super Bowl of Freemasonry," according to the new Right Worshipful Grand Master of Pennsylvania, William Slater II. No footballs were thrown, but the one-day event, called the "Man to Mason" project, attracted many men, all in hopes of becoming new members of the Masonic brotherhood.

Grand Master Slater, the youngest Grand Master in 100 years to lead the Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania, spearheaded the event. The goal for the one-day class was to get 10,000 candidates in 13 different cities throughout Pennsylvania, ultimately increasing membership in each Lodge by 10 percent. The year long project commenced January 1, 2004 and ended on December 31.

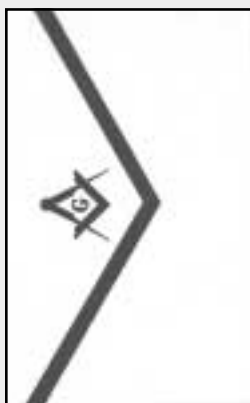
